The strategy in this course is to start developing basic geometries using the **Autodesk Fusion 360** software towards understanding the software interface and processes. The interface will be followed by form manipulation and model preparation, both essential components in successful additive manufacturing.

In this module you will explore the analysing tools and how to prepare your design for 3D printing.

Module 6: Utilizing external slicing software in preparation for 3D printing

Various 3D printers come with their manufacturer slicing software, which is recommended to use with the printer. However, these slicing softwares all utilize similar approaches to translate virtual geometry into code that can be understood by the 3D printer.
